#### **IN MEMORIAM**

## David T. Wallingford Sr., Captain, USMC


The Friends of the New York State Military Museum recently said goodbye to Dave Wallingford, a dear friend and truly dedicated and longtime member and leader. He was a past President and Trustee of the Friends and was honored as our Veteran of the Year in 2022. Dave was an American hero who was grievously wounded in service to our beloved nation - as an officer with the 3rd Marine Division (I Corps) - during the Vietnam War as a member of the U.S. Marine Corps. During his hospitalization and recovery at the USNH in Yokosuka, Japan, he met Lieutenant Helene Hill, a nurse in the U.S. Navy. He proposed to Helene five days later and they were ultimately married for 55 years, blessed with four children and eight grandchildren.

Dave poignantly passed away on March 25, 2025, the very date that he was grievously wounded in service to our nation in 1969. Notably, this date is also in close proximity to March 29, the annual day that a truly grateful nation observes National Vietnam War Veterans Day to honor and remember all who served during the Vietnam War. Brigadier General (USA Ret) Barry Hartman - the Master of Ceremonies of the 50th Vietnam War Commemoration that was held at the New York State Military Museum on March 29 - poignantly paid tribute to Dave Wallingford during his opening remarks.

Dave was recognized with many awards and honors over the years. His vital contributions to our nation and community are simply too numerous to list. For his service in Vietnam, he was awarded the Bronze Star Medal with Combat V device, the Navy Commendation Medal with Combat V device, two Purple Hearts, Combat Action Ribbon, Presidential Unit Citation, Navy Unit Commendation, Meritorious Unit Commendation and various campaign medals and ribbons. Dave spent much of his adult life in service to his fellow Veterans. In 1999, he was appointed a Special Assistant to the Director of the NYS Division of Veterans Affairs and later became a Deputy Director for the NYS Division of Veterans Affairs. He was active in local veteran organizations, including Disabled American Veterans, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Marine Corps League, the Purple Heart Association, and the Friends of the New York State Military Museum. He was also a co-founding member of the Malta Veterans Appreciation Program.

Dave was a person of immense character and exhibited courage, duty, honor, loyalty, and love of country. It is often said that the reason that each succeeding generation can see so far and enjoy such abundant blessings and freedoms is that it indeed stands on the shoulders of giants like Dave Wallingford. *Semper Fidelis* ("Always Faithful") is the storied motto of the U.S. Marine Corps. Well, I think that everyone that knew Dave can readily attest to the fact that the same can certainly be said to describe the life and example of Dave Wallingford.

I'd like to humbly thank all of the Friends of the New York State Military Museum - Docents, Advisory Board Members, and Trustees - as well as the dedicated members of the Museum's staff from the New York State Division of Military and Naval Affairs, who were able to gather together in solidarity at Dave's funeral on April 3 at St. Clement's Church in Saratoga Springs. Our deepest condolences and fervent prayers remain with the Wallingford family during this time of sorrow. We will endeavor to honor and remember this good man and true patriot and pledge to be worthy of his service and sacrifice. Dave never forgot his fellow Veterans. Now that he belongs to the ages, we will ensure that he is never forgotten nor the many years of service that he rendered to the Friends of the New York State Military Museum. Semper Fi Dave and may perpetual light shine upon you.

## FRIENDS HONOR VIETNAM VETS ON VIETNAM VETERANS DAY

The Friends of the New York State Military Museum, along with the Association of the United States Army — Capital District of New York Chapter, held a ceremony at the New York State Military Museum in Saratoga on Saturday, March 29, 2025, to honor the service of Vietnam War Era veterans who served between November 1, 1955 and May 15, 1975. The honor included members of all forces in existence during the Vietnam Era —the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines and Coast Guard. The date of the ceremony (March 29) is the date annually recognized as National Vietnam Veterans Day.

Veterans in attendance, as well as surviving spouses of deceased veterans, received a Vietnam Era Lapel Pin issued by the Department of Defense. Vietnam Era Veterans were also given the opportunity to make remarks.

Friends members Mark O'Rourke, Barry Hartman, Nick Laiacona and Bob Van Pelt were among those who took part in organizing the ceremony.

# MUSEUM PRESENTATION AND EXHIBIT ON LIBERATION OF CONCENTRATION CAMPS IN 1945

The Winter/Spring 2025 Speaker Series at the Museum concluded on Saturday, April 26 with a program entitled "The Rainbow Division and the Liberation of Dachau."

The program included a presentation by Richard Goldenberg, retired 42nd Division officer and veteran of the Iraq War. Goldenberg spoke about the actions of the 42nd Infantry Division across Europe in the winter and spring of 1945, including its race to Munich and the Division's liberation of the Nazi concentration camp at Dachau in late April of 1945.

The 42nd Division, a division of the New York Army National Guard, was initially formed during World War I. It was nicknamed the "Rainbow Division" because it was formed from 27 National Guard units from across the United States. The division is currently headquartered in Troy, NY.


Holocaust Educator Evelyn Loeb also spoke at the event. Ms. Loeb, who lives in the Capital Region, spoke about her father's imprisonment at Dachau, as well as his emigration to the United States after the War and his subsequent service in the American Army.


The event also featured the display of a pictorial exhibit on two stories which are related to the actions of the Rainbow Division in the Second World War:

One part of the exhibit concerns the career of Lee Miller, a female photojournalist who took pictures in the field, as well as pictures at Dachau and pictures in the apartment of Adolf Hitler, after it had been captured by Allied troops.

The other part of the exhibit concerns the story of Richard Marowitz, a Jewish soldier who was part of the Rainbow Division in World War II. Marowitz, then 19 years old, had seen Dachau with the Division, and the next day he also got to see Hitler's apartment. While there, he stomped on Hitler's silk top hat and took it with him. He later moved to the Capital Region, and he kept the hat until he died in 2014.













#### IN MEMORIAM: STANLEY URBAETIS

Stanley Urbaetis ("Stan"), long-time Docent at the New York State Military Museum, passed away on Wednesday, April 2, 2025, at the age of 94.

Stan was born in Mechanicville. He graduated from Mechanicville High School in 1948. He enlisted in the US Navy in 1951 and honorably served until his discharge in 1954. He began his Navy service on the USS Macon, but later he transferred to the USS Missouri. He was particularly proud of being a part of the Missouri's final cruise, through the Panama Canal and along the West Coast to Bremerton, Washington; the Missouri was the ship on which the Japanese had surrendered to the Allies at the end of World War II. Stan was discharged after attaining the rank of Petty Officer Second Class. He was awarded the National Defense Service Medal and the Navy Occupation Service Medal with European clasp.

Stan had a long career with General Electric. In his early work, he was involved in the development of test firing of the Vulcan 20mm six-barrel cannon, as well as in the testing of components for the Hermes missile (which had been upgraded to project a man-made object into orbit). Later, he worked as a heat transfer specialist at GE's Research and Development Department. He retired from GE after 44 years of service.

Colleen Maheux, Office Manager of the Museum, knew Stan and his family. She said: "Stan was not only a wonderful docent at the Museum, but he was also a friend. I grew up with his children, and I always had the most immense respect for him. He was a great father, husband, volunteer, and friend. He was a very successful and hard-working man. Stan will be missed by many."

Stan is survived by his wife of 66 years, Carol Stoliaroff Urbaetis, by his five children, by many grandchildren and great-grandchildren, and by two brothers.
